


What is FoodShare?

- This federally funded program enables hundreds of thousands of low-income adults, children, and seniors throughout the state with funds to purchase groceries.

Who Uses FoodShare in Wisconsin?*









48% of families have at least one member who is elderly, blind or has disabilities.



Percentage of Poverty






Barron County Poverty

- Barron has a moderate level of poverty (12.0%), ranking it 43rd out of 72 counties.
- Barron has a moderate level of child poverty (16.9%), ranking it 47th out of 72 counties.
