


What is FoodShare?

Who Uses FoodShare in Wisconsin?*









48% of families have at least one member who is elderly, blind or has disabilities.




For every **\$1** in FoodShare benefits, an additional **51.70** is used in the **local** economy.

Percentage of Poverty





Kewaunee County Poverty

- Kewaunee has a low level of poverty (8.5%), ranking it 11th out of 72 counties.
- Kewaunee has a low level of child poverty (8.9%), ranking it 9th out of 72 counties.
- Kewaunee has a high level of senior poverty (10.3%), ranking it 62nd out of 72 counties.
