

- This federally funded program enables hundreds of thousands of low-income adults, children, and seniors throughout the state with funds to purchase groceries.

Who Uses FoodShare in Wisconsin?*








42% of recipients are children.





Economic Growth

Percentage of Poverty






Sheboygan County Poverty

- Sheboygan has a moderate level of poverty (10.1%), ranking it 26h out of 72 counties.
- Sheboygan has a moderate level of child poverty (15.3%), ranking it 39th out of 72 counties.
- Sheboygan has a moderate level of senior poverty (8.1%), ranking it 42nd out of 72 counties.
